Fortunately, we live in a low-crime area. However, recent events, including a garage break-in in Long Thurlow, remind us that we can never be too careful.

# Your Rights to Privacy: A New Guide from the Parish Council

The Badwell Ash Parish Council is pleased to announce the first in a new series of guidance documents for residents, focused on personal and community safety. This initial guide, "Your rights to Privacy," addresses a topic that has been a concern for some residents: the use of CCTV in community spaces.

The document clarifies that while CCTV is a common tool for security and crime prevention, individuals have specific rights regarding the collection of their personal data under the General Data Protection Regulations 2018 (GDPR).

This is especially relevant in cases where cameras may be placed in locations where people have a reasonable expectation of privacy, such as during fitness classes, events with young children, or life-drawing sessions.

The guide explains what an acceptable CCTV plan looks like, with cameras placed in appropriate areas like entrances, car parks, and key internal locations, while respecting privacy.

It also outlines your rights if you believe a CCTV system is intrusive. You lifesaving skills. Participants received have the right to challenge an organisation's GDPR policy, ask why your data is being collected, and understand how it's being used and stored. The document provides a list of difference in the moments before key questions you can ask and explains how to make a formal complaint with the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) if needed.

### Lifesaving Skills for Our Community



In September, our village hall hosted a training session with the Suffolk Accident Rescue Service (SARS), a charity that provides specialist volunteer medical teams to assist at emergencies. The free course, generously funded by the Parish Council, was a huge success, giving attendees vital knowledge and practical skills that could one day save a life.

While we learned about the crucial role SARS plays in our county, the main

focus of the day was on hands-on, training in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and learned how to use a defibrillator. These skills are invaluable, as they can make a critical professional help arrives. Knowing how to perform CPR and use our community's defibrillators empowers us to respond effectively in an emergency.

The training also provided an insight into the costs of running SARS, which is a charity that is not governmentfunded and relies on grants and donations to operate. In fact, the charity's payments for its activities increased to over £176,000 in 2024.

The sight of the international teams, with their vibrant jerseys and state-ofthe-art bikes, was a truly unforgettable spectacle that put our village briefly in the national spotlight. The day's stage was won in a dominant sprint finish by Olav Kooij of Team Visma | Lease a Bike, who also extended his lead in the overall race.

Organisers used a "rolling road closure" system, which meant any disruption was kept to a minimum. This clever system ensured everyone could enjoy the event without significant inconvenience.

It was wonderful to see so many of you lining the route and cheering on the riders. It was a proud moment to see our village play host to such a major event.

#### A rare iron age discovery in **Badwell Ash**

Few villages can boast an Iron Age canoe-like trough among their local treasures, but Badwell Ash can!

Discovered during excavations at Shackerland Hall quarry in 1998, this extraordinary wooden artefact had been lying quietly beneath the soil for 2,000 years.

#### Craftsmanship

Carved from high-quality oak using axes with incredible skill.

Measuring 1.3m long and 57cm wide, and could hold up to 50 litres.

Its elegant shape suggests it was a high-status object - both practical and decorative.

The artistry is striking. Only a handful of toolmarks remain, proof of the skill,

care and exceptional ability of its Iron Age makers.



#### A curious clue

Before being deposited in the ground, the trough was deliberately scuffed along its

base until it was almost worn through. Marks suggest it was dragged across a stony surface by rope, possibly along an early road.

farewell? We may never know.

Although a second object was found nearby - at first thought to be a paddle - it turned out to be only a broken plank. A shame, as it would have added another dimension to the story.

#### So, why does it matter?

While Roman wooden objects are relatively common, Iron Age examples are rare. The trough is of national importance and offers precious insights into:

- Iron Age woodworking techniques
- Use of oak for prestigious items
- The role of display as well as function in everyday objects.

#### Where to see it?

Was this damage symbolic? A ritual? A The restored tough is now on display at Moyse's Hall Museum in Bury St Edmunds and kept under carefully controlled conditions of light and humidity. It stands as a remarkable link between the villagers of today and their distant ancestors.

## Citizen's Advice

### Understanding Your Payslip a guide for those returning to work

If you've recently returned to work after some time away, you might find your payslip a bit confusing. You're not alone – it can take a little time to get used to the different sections and terms.

By law, employers must give you a payslip (on paper or online) showing what you've been paid and what's been deducted. It's a good idea to keep your payslips for up to six years, just in case you need them later.

Your payslip should include your employer's details, your name, and possibly an employee number. You'll also see a payment date (when your pay reaches your bank) and a tax period. The UK tax year starts in April, so tax period 01 is April, 02 is May, and so on.

You'll also see your National Insurance (NI) number - this is your personal number used to record your NI

contributions, which help you qualify for state benefits like the pension.

Next is your tax code, set by HMRC. This usually includes numbers and a letter. The numbers show how much of your income is tax-free; the letter reflects your situation. You can check what your tax code means at https:// www.gov.uk/tax-codes/what-your-taxcode-means. If you're on an 'emergency' code (ending in W1, M1 or X), you might be paying too much tax, so it's worth checking.

anything is taken off. This might include your basic pay plus extras like travel allowance. If you're paid by the hour, the rate and hours worked should be shown. If holiday pay is included with your wages, it should be listed separately.

Deductions may include tax, National Insurance, pension, or student loan payments. These are added up, and what's left is your net pay - the amount that goes into your bank.



You might also see taxable pay, showing how much of your income has been taxed so far this year.

If anything doesn't seem right, it's best to speak to your employer.

# Recipe - Creamy sweetcorn and Chorizo soup

Jungle Gym - tips for surviving in the urban jungle.

Hi Jungle Gym here.

As the sun goes down after a busy day surviving in the jungle, it's time to settle down with some good hearty grub.

Try my thick and creamy sweetcorn and chorizo soup with fresh chives.

#### Ingredients:

Good glug of Extra Virgin Olive Oil 1x bag of frozen

sweetcorn (750g) 2x large potatoes (350g)

1x large onion 5x garlic cloves 1/2 bag of fresh chives - chopped 750ml Vegetable Stock



1x double packet

chorizo crumb pieces (120g or 2x 60g) - you can pick these up from the

cooked meats section of Waitrose or Sainsbury's

1/2 carton of Elmlea Double cream (135ml)

#### **Equipment:**

Large saucepan Wooden stirring spoon Potato peeler Hand blender Scissors

#### Recipe:

Finely chop the onion and garlic, then add them to a large saucepan with the olive oil. Heat until soft.

Peel and chop the potatoes into small pieces. Add the vegetable stock to the large saucepan and bring to a boil. Simmer for 20 minutes.

Once the potatoes are cooked, remove rainy day. Good luck and enjoy! from the heat and add the bag of sweet corn together with the Elmlea cream. Bring back to a boil, stirring so

nothing sticks to the bottom of the pan. Then, remove from the heat.

Blitz the mixture with the blender until smooth.

Then, using the scissors, snip in the chives, throw in the chorizo crumb, and fold into the mixture. Finally, add salt and pepper to taste.



Reheat and serve. You should have four good-sized servings.

I often make a big batch and freeze

servings in plastic containers for a rainy day. Good luck and enjoy!

# Green Dilemmas - eating less meat and the impact on climate change

There are lots of reasons cited for eating less meat ranging from concerns about animal welfare to health issues. Increasingly it's the impact of meat production on climate change that is being highlighted. Meat production uses more energy, water and land than plant based foods and is a major contributor of greenhouse gas emissions. According to UN figures about 14% of all emissions come from meat production.

However, if you look at the data there are lots of complexities.

The impact of meat production varies by the type of meat: chicken and pork have the smallest climate impact, lamb is in the middle and beef is the least sustainable choice. One of the problems is muddling the UK with the global situation. For example the environmental impact of beef farming varies dramatically depending on the farming practices. In say South America where deforestation is taking place the environmental impact is huge whereas the UK already has good pasture quality and effective management practices.

Cattle and to a lesser extent sheep produce methane mainly via burping. Methane is a potent greenhouse gas but unlike CO2 which has a cumulative impact methane only lasts in the atmosphere for about 12 years. This means that if the number of animals stabilises the level of greenhouse gases will also stabilise. Conversely a reduction in animals would have an immediate cooling impact.

Another complexity is that ironically intensive farming has a lower carbon footprint. For example the world's largest 'climate efficient' pig farm in China is a 26 story sky scraper slaughtering over 1 million pigs a year equivalent to 25% of total UK pig production. Similarly intensively farmed people are tryin portions of high produced meat suggests that the cost issues while smaller portions with other protections.

chicken has a lower carbon footprint than free-range chickens.

In the UK agriculture uses 70% of all land of which 85% is used for livestock but this only provides 32% of the calories we eat. However, a lot of this land isn't suitable for growing crops. Rewilding the least productive areas of grazing land and paying farmers to manage this would reduce climate change and be relatively easy to implement. Rewilding huge areas of pasture land raises questions about food security and about the risk of switching our meat consumption to imports with lower environmental standards.

The volume of meat we eat in the UK is actually on the decline. This is partly due to the rise in veganism and vegetarianism and partly that some people are trying to eat smaller portions of higher quality locally produced meat. Research also suggests that the decline is linked to cost issues which has resulted in smaller portions; meat being mixed with other proteins or meat being eaten less frequently.
